### Anticipation Guide

In the pre-reading column, write **A** if you agree with the statement and **D** if you disagree with the statement based on your beliefs and opinions. There are no right or wrong answers here—the goal is to get you thinking about ideas found in the text. After reading the novella, you will determine if the work itself supports or refutes the statements below. Write **S** if the novella agrees with the statement or write **R** if the novella disagrees with the statement. You will use textual evidence (page #'s) to prove your answer.
