When writing a sentence, sometimes it can be tricky to know when to use the word was versus

the word <i>were</i> to describe the subject of the sentence. <i>Were</i> is commonly used when the subject of the sentence is plural (more than one person, place, thing, idea) in the past tense, and <i>was</i> is commonly used when the subject of the sentence is singular (one person, place, thing, idea) in the past tense.		
Examples:		
The Beecher Prep students <i>were</i> shocked to see Auggie on the first day of school. (plural subject)		
Via was thrilled when Auggie was born. (singular subject)
