

1933: The Birth of Ruth Bader Ginsburg

Ruth Bader Ginsburg was born in Brooklyn, New York, in 1933. Her parents, Nathan and Cecelia Bader, called her Joan Ruth Bader. Ruth had one sister called Marilyn.

Ruth grew up in a poor working-class neighborhood. Her family was Jewish, and she and her parents were often discriminated against because they were Jewish.

Discrimination against Jewish people is called anti-Semitism, and it still is still around today.

Ruth's mother Cecelia was a big influence in Ruth's life. Although Cecelia had been a good student and had finished high school when she was 15, she wasn't allowed to go to college. Instead, her brother was sent to college. Even though Ruth's father didn't believe that girls should go to college, it was Cecelia's dream to see Ruth go to Harvard University.

Unfortunately, Cecelia never saw her dream come true. The day before Ruth graduated from high school, Cecelia died of cancer. But Ruth did fulfill her mother's dream. Ruth got a full scholarship and attended Harvard University.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg's mother earned believed in the importance of independence. Ruth Bader Ginsburg once said "My mother told me to be a lady. And for her, that meant be your own person, be independent."
